

(John and Hardie Sanders are said to have come to Moore County from Randolph. Their mother is said to have been a McKenzie.)

- I. Rev. Hardie Sanders married Sally Williams who lived to be about 84. The second time he married Sarah Brewer. (Both Hardie and Sallie are buried in the yard of the old homeplace near Spies. Hardie was a Mason and has that mark on his headstone.) Hardie was born Sept. 1807; died July 21, 1895.
- II. Children of this union were:

- A. Jessie who was wounded in the Civil War and who made baskets for aliving on Hwy. 27 on Dry Creek. His son W.C. "Bud" Sanders is buried at Browns Chapel (3/6/1886 - 3/5/1911)
- B. Brittlian who was born Sept. 2, 1831 and died Feb. 28, 1913 and married Susy Morgan, daughter of John Morgan the first time and had one child, Sally (who later married William Britt and had John Andrew, Rufus, Naomi, Susie, Bud, Dora and Neta)

Brittlian married Spicey Morgan the second time, also the daughter of John Morgan. She was born June 1, 1887, died Nov. 10, 1913. Both are buried at Browns Chapel. (Children: Nathan, Hardie, John, Andrew, Janie, Malinda, Camilla, Bill and infant (d)) He was called into the Civil War, left his plow standing in the field and served 3 years, leaving wife and four children. They lived in log house on top of hill above Cabin Creek which has now been restored and moved to the premises of the Shaw Place in Southern Pines. He was in the Battle of Gettysburg and also Cold Harbor. The children of Brittlian and Spicey were: Nathan, Hardie, John, Andrew, Janie, Malinda, Camilla, Bill and a little girl who died at birth.

- C. Isham married Mary McNeil, both buried at Browns Chapel. He was born May 27, 1834, died March 18, 1923. Their children: Martha Jane (Aaron Brewer): Dan (Marrie Brown) Street who moved to Georgia; Zeb (Jenkins); Hugh (Annie from Salisbury); Henry (Ida Sheffield); Alice (Pat Feeney who is buried at Browns Chapel: P.W. Feeney (a Mason) May 9, 1856 - Jan. 1, 1915. Alice is buried at Charlotte near her daughter, Mrs. Hill Ballard; Cora (Elkanah Brewer) both buried at Star; and Ora Dell (Walter Lambert)- Ora Dell buried beside parents at Browns Chapel. (June 27, 1887-Dec. 5, 1909) Three of Isham's granddaughters are Berta Brewer Morgan of near Browns Chapel; Helva Brewer Robinson of 3007 S. Dear Mrs. McColl:

Joel Fleishman referred to me your note regarding Brittain Sanders. Mrs. Ives had also asked me to see what I could find out about him.

While home over the holiday, I checked my records for information, though with small results. Chronologically stated, this is what I have:

Brittain Sanders apparently came to Johnston County [†] with his father, whose name apparently was James, about 1757. The family settled on Middle Creek, about ten miles south of the present site of Raleigh. This area was cut off into Wake County in 1770, when that county was formed. They lived somewhere near McCollers, which you will find on a good road map just west of U.S. 15-A, between Raleigh and Fuquay.

This Brittain, whom I shall call Brittain Sr., married Edith Hunter of Wake County in May 1786, and their marriage bond can be found in the Wake marriage bonds in the Department of Archives and History, Raleigh. The 1790 census lists the family as including one white male under 16. At the time of his death, in 1798, Brittain Sr. had at least five children, who are listed in his will. They are: Aley, Brittain, David, Theophilus, and Elizabeth. Brittain Sr.'s will is to be found in the office of the Wake County Clerk of the Superior Court, Book 4, page 255.

Brittain Sr. was a delegate from Wake Court to the North Carolina constitutional conventions of 1788 and 1789, called to consider the federal constitution. N.C. Manual of 1913, p. 902. He was a member of the House of Commons from Wake for the sessions of 1787, 1788, 1789, 1790, 1791, 1792, 1793. N.C. Manual of 1913, pp. 827-829. He was also sheriff of Wake County in the 1780's, though I am not sure of the exact date at present.

† Their point of origin I do not know - perhaps Virginia.

Brittain Sr. had a brother, Hardy, who was my great-great-great grandfather, and who lived in the same part of Wake. He also was sheriff of the county about 1780, a member of the House of Commons in 1778 and 1783, and Colonel of the Wake militia. Another brother, John, moved to Johnston early, and the clan in that county at present is mostly of his line, though some of them come from my branch, and most of them are their own cousins several times over, due to intermarriage.

Brittain Jr. was apparently Brittain H. Sanders; at least the name often so appears. The H. in all probability stands for Hunter (his mother's maiden name) or Hardy (his uncle's name). He married Eliza Turner of Wake in February 1812. The marriage bond is with the Wake marriage bonds in the Department of Archives and History. He is listed on the tax books of Wake County as late as 1814, though this does not necessarily mean that he was still living there that late. His brother Aley married in Wake, and died at Haywood, in Chatham County, 27 September 1819.

That, I'm afraid, is about the limit of my knowledge. I have never done much work on Brittain Sr. or his line. My guess is that Brittain H. is your man, but I couldn't be sure unless I could check further into the matter.

I will be happy to hear from you regarding any information or leads you have found in your search.


Regarding the history--as soon as I can get time, I think I can get some information that will be a guide to you in learning more about the old house. No, the people in that section are not ancestors of mine. I originated in Connecticut. My mother bought another 100 acres from Hardy Sanders in 1901. Hardy Sanders then bought the 100 acres on which this house stood from his father, Britton Sanders, with a life lien on the place and the right to live in this old log house. This place was known as the Britton Sanders place. Hardy Sanders built the frame house near the barn and lived there until his death two or three years later and then my mother bought the Britton Sanders house from Hardy Sanders about 1904 or 1905. I think I have some old deeds that go back before the fire, which are in the Moore County Court House. I will look these up at the first opportunity and give you more information. My mother's name was Esther M. Beebe.

The deed you found, dated in 1949, where Mary Elder Beebe (my sister) deeded 2.1 acres to Hogan and Allen, was where our house stood, which I later had taken down. It had nothing to do with the Britton Sanders place. I sold some 400 or 500 acres to Hogan and Allen.

As soon as I have time, I think I can send you some more information.

Hardy Sanders - 1859 -
Land Grants

According to family "heresay", the first records show that two Sanders (now spelled "Saunders") brothers, JOHN and HARDY migrated to Moore County from Randolph County, coming originally from Virginia. Their father was unknown and their mother thought to have been a MCKENZIE. JOHN settled in Montgomery County and HARDY in Moore County.

- I. HARDY SANDERS (born Sept. 1807-died July 21, 1895) married SALLY WILLIAMS (About 84 -according to her headstone) and married SARAH BREWER the second time. Both HARDY and SALLY buried in yard of homeplace near Spies, N. C. HARDY was a part-time Christian preacher, filling the pulpit at times at Brown's Chapel Church nearby, and he was a Mason with this mark on his headstone.

II. Children of HARDY and SALLY SANDERS include:

- A. JESSIE who lived on Highway 27 in Moore County and made caskets. Lived on Dry Creek; His son was W.C. "Bud" Sanders (3/6/1885 - 3/5/1911, buried at Brown's Chapel. Burial place of JESSIE unknown. See Civil War military record for JESSIE who was wounded in the war. "Bud" was a member of the Jr. Order, which is noted on his headstone.
- B. BRITTIAN who was born Sept. 2, 1831 and died Feb. 28, 1913 and was married to SUSY MORGAN, daughter of John Morgan the first time and had one child, SALLY who later married William Britt and had John Andrew, Rufus, Naomi, Susie, Bud, Dora and Meta.

The second time he married SPICEY MORGAN, also a daughter of JOHN MORGAN. She was born June 1, 1887 and died Nov. 10, 1913. Both BRITTIAN and SARAH are buried in Brown's Chapel cemetery in Moore County.

BRITTIAN was taken into the service of the Southern forces during the Civil War, left his plow standing in the field and served 3 years, leaving his wife and 4 children. They lived in a small log house on top of the hill above Cabin Creek which has now been moved to the Shaw House Place in Southern Pines and restored. He was at Gettysburg and also in Battle of Cold Harbor. He was a farmer by trade and worked the pine forests for turpentine. Children of BRITTIAN and SPICEY were: NATHAN, HARDY, JOHN, ANDREW, JANIE, MALINDA, CAMILLA, BILL and a little girl who died at birth. See following page. Also Civil War military record.

- C. ISHAM married MARY MCNEIL. both buried at Brown's Chapel. He was born May 27, 1834 and died March 18, 1923. See military record for his duty during Civil War. A letter written this year by Coy Saunders of Arkansas (son of JOHN by second marriage) tells that ISHAM was a very religious man and often prayed "loud and long" during Brown's Chapel services. Coy says as a child he was impressed with the long flowing beard that fell over ISHAM'S chest and the manner in which he prayed, heedless of any motion or distraction that went on around him. Children of ISHAM and MARY MCNEIL SANDERS were as follows:
1. Martha Jane who married Aaron Brewer
 2. Dan who married Maggie Brown
 3. Street who moved away to Georgia.
 4. Zeb who married a Jenkins. (Said to have at one time taught school in Moore County)
 5. Hugh who married Annie _____ from Salisbury.

 7. Alice who married P. W. "Pat" Feeney. (He was a Mason, is buried at Robbins in the Methodist Church Cemetery (May 9, 1856 - Jan. 1, 1915) Alice is buried at Charlotte near her daughter, Mrs. Hill Ballard who lived near Charlotte in Belmont.) Alice was mother of Barney Feeney who married Helen McKenzie, daughter of Frank and Mary Morgan McKenzie.
 8. Cora who married Elkanah Brewer; both buried at Star in the Leach Cemetery*
 9. Ora Dell who married Walter Lambert; she is buried beside her parents at Brown's Chapel cemetery. (June 27, 1887 - Dec. 5, 1909)

* Children of Elkanah: Annie Lee, Claude, Giles, Carl of Star.

III. Children of Brittan and Spicey included:

- A. John - Aug. 21, 1859 - June 3, 1933; married Deliatha Smith (March 6, 1863 - Aug. 3, 1894) daughter of Hiram Smith and Mary Anne Freeman who are also buried at Browns Chapel near John and Deliatha. Children of John and Deliatha: Annie (Ta Wallace, both buried in Albemarle); Luther (Molly Mitchell, d. of the Billy Mitchells - both buried at Leach Cemetery in Star); Anderson who married Florence Williamson, eldest daughter of Emily Davis and Labon Williamson of Star; Dora who married a Britt; and Jim who married "Bobby" Olga of Lexington, S. C. Three children who died as infants are buried near them in Browns Chapel: an infant, John C. (1889-1893) and Almedia (1887-1892); The second time, John married Annie Brewer. She is buried in Rockingham. Children of the second marriage: Coy, Conev, Lula Mae, Blennie, Lonnie, Charlie, Mary, Winfred, L. B. and Thad.
- B. Nathan - married Katherine McKenzie, sister of John McKenzie, buried at Browns Chapel; Children were Vander, John, Dan (buried at Leach Cemetery in Star), George
- C. Hardie: married Katherine McKenzie's sister, Jane McKenzie; Children: Alec (buried at Leach Cemetery in Star); (Hardie and wife buried at Browns Chapel) John A. was section foreman many years on the railroad at Hemp. (Aug. 11, 1884-Sept. 6, 1952)
- D. Malinda (May 5, 1866 - Sept. 2, 1905) married John George (March 2, 1846-Apr. 25, 1929) both buried at Browns Chapel
- E. Camilla married Joe Brewer of Moore County but later moved to Star and then to High Point, where both are buried. Children: Ethel (Leach); Walter, Jim, Dudley and Hughey.
- F. Jane married Hy Wallace, both buried in Rockingham. Children: Hugh T., John, Julie and two small ones who died in infancy.
- G. Bill married Rosa Vestal and lived in Greensboro for many years. Father of Flossie Bodenheimer of Asbury.
- H. Andrew (buried at Mt. Carmel) married Maggie Brown. He was born 1868 and it was through him that much of the information on the family has been asserbled. No children to this union.
- I. Little girl who died at birth

JESSE SANDERS-- Co "F", 3rd Inf. Regiment; sworn in JULY 15, 1862 wounded
at Gettysburg. He is buried at Ben Salem.

ISHAM SANDERS-not listed in roster, but served in the same company
with Martin Brewer. To affirm this, I talked a long time, Ardena and I,
to Martin's grandsons who remembered hearing him tell the same stories.

Last year I made a report on the log cabin and said that while old timers told us it was about 200 years old, we had no real proof. Now I am glad to be able to present what we can consider authentic proof of it's approximate age.

To go back to the history of the Sanders family, from Mr. John L. Sanders of Four Oaks these facts about the first Brittan Sanders were learned.

He came to Johnson County with his father, James Sanders about 1757 and settled about ten miles below the present site of Raleigh. He had a son named Brittan and a brother named Hardy. These two names seem to run through every generation of his family and of the cabin family in Moore County which seems evidence that they were the same. The son or grandson came to Moore County and settled on Cabin Creek, we do not know when, but grants of land were made to him from the state at various dates from 1835 and 1859, covering the cabin property and adjacent lands. Grants were not filed promptly in those days and he might have got the land sooner. The cabin was evidently on the land when he came and its builder is still an unsolved mystery. It was handed down from Brittain to Hardy and then to another Brittain. From him the cabin evidently got its name, though he handed it down to another Hardy, his son in 1903. They sold the place out of the family to Mr. Harwood Beebe's mother, Mrs. Esther M. Beebe of Connecticut in 1904. Mr. Beebe was raised on the place in a frame house which was built by his family and later torn down

From him I have received the information about the approximate age of the cabin. He writes, About the year 1910 Brittain Sanders, who was then at least 75 years old stated to me that when he was a shirt-tail boy the roof was being replaced on the cabin. Shirt-tail boy means something under five years old, when the youngsters wore only little shirts. So the roof of the cabin when you got it was probably put on about the year 1840. If the original roof had lasted a similar length of time, it would date the house to about 1770. I would judge it is that old or older, because of the lack of nails in its construction and the use of pegs in their place.

Mr. Beebe's address is Spartanburg, and he is rated one of the best engineers, also he has been in lumber business, so he should be a good judge of a roof. He was about 21 years old in 1910 when he had the conversation with Brittain. He has sent us two old deeds, one 1885 and one in 1903 that had been left in his possession, the first is from Hardy and wife Sally to Brittain Sanders, the second from Brittain and wife Spicey to Hardy Sanders. These will be put in our archives for preservation.

WHAT WE BELIEVE

We believe we are on the right track, but of course some of this is speculation. We do have positive proof that Grand-Daddy Hardy's father's name was Jesse. Look at your marriage certificate of Hardy. In 1800 no Sanders owned land in Moore County. However, the 1815 census shows Jesse Sanders owning two 100 acres plus, one 50 acres of land. We are enclined to believe that Jesse Sanders came to Moore County before the turn of the century, and for all we know could have been the builder of the house. Could it be possible that the Brittian which is underlined might have been named Jesse Brittian? Remember, Hardy was born in 1805; remember, too, that the first Sanders to come to this country was John Sanders, age 18 years old, in the year 1633. If you will compare the dates of the report from John L. Sanders, except the one name, every thing falls in place. We do not know about Jesse's age, but we do know the name is correct.
